MINISTER"S MESSAGE

I was noticing the trees lining Timm Road on the morning after our first frost, and it seemed that literally overnight they had gone from green to red and gold and orange. St. Paul told the church at Corinth that "we will all be changed, in a moment, in



the twinkling of an eye . . . " Like leaves on a tree in the early autumn we will be changed overnight. How true that is for so many of us. Life takes one course and then, without warning, in a moment, our direction is changed sometimes completely and forever.

Life is so ever full of these transitions: from our house to a retirement home, from employment to retirement, from illness to health, from wounds to recovery. When God created humankind, it was surely the Creator's intent that we would always be in transition. I like St. Paul's word, "transformation." For him, it was at the heart of living, and of dying. In this life we are constantly being transformed. In death, we are transformed most closely into the likeness of Jesus. From our birth to our new life beyond death, we are in one continuous transformation of our being.

I was talking with someone recently about their oneyear old, and we were again amazed at the transformation which happens in that first year of life. The helpless infant begins to walk and talk and feed themselves, and engage the world around. It is a year of radical transformation. It is the kind of year which I think St. Paul had in mind for those who took up the life of being Jesus' disciples in our world. Learning more about Jesus, living his mission and love in our lives would change us overnight, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye. Because we would take on new values, and new understandings of how we are to live in the world.

Autumn is a time for changing colours, for being transformed into our Christ-like selves and letting the course of life find a new way, full of abundance and hope.

GENERAL COUNCIL 41 TO BE HELD IN OTTAWA IN AUGUST 2012

Now that my term of office as Chair of Presbytery has finished, I am moving on to my next task, Co-Chair of the Local Arrangements Committee for General Council 41.

The United Church is organized into four levels, starting with the local congregation or pastoral charge, then presbytery, conference, and finally General Council. Every three years representatives from across Canada meet together to worship, celebrate, and make policy decisions in what is known as General Council.

Three years ago, Ottawa Presbytery extended an invitation to the General Council to meet in summer 2012 in Ottawa, saying: "where better than in the heart of the nation's capital region, built on traditional Algonquin land, to connect with the bilingual, multicultural nature of our country, to explore partnerships for justice with many national coalitions . . . and to lift the face of the UCC in the place where national policy is shaped."

The National Capital Area has hosted this meeting twice before, once in 1936, and the last time in 1958 when John Diefenbaker was Prime Minister. So we are glad that 54 years later, they are coming back.

General Council 41 will be held at Carleton University from Saturday, August 11th, to Saturday, August 18th, 2012. Some 600 commissioners, youth, children, staff, special guests, and visitors will participate. Ottawa Presbytery wants to give a warm welcome to our guests and to make their stay as pleasant as possible. Moreover, it is also a time to show the United Church in this region.

Thus, we are seeking help from all of the pastoral charges to recruit volunteers to help with planning the local arrangements and in carrying out these tasks during the event. These tasks include such things as greeting at the airport, transporting luggage from registration to residences, assisting in setting up displays, helping at the registration table or information desk, planning local special events, distributing documents, serving as a first aid coordinator, or baking cookies and muffins.

Whether you have a few hours or a week to commit, we need your support to show what a vibrant, welcoming presbytery we are. It is also a good way to appreciate the wider church.

You may do exactly the same with your givings.

Simply fill out an application form (available at the Welcome Table in the Foyer and in the pamphlet rack), attach a void cheque, submit it to our Church Administrator Patricia Will before the 10th of the month, and you can be on PAR for that month. The withdrawal is made from your account on the 15th of each month.

The **gift card program** is an excellent way to support ongoing fundraising for the church as well. To date, we have raised \$2,542. This is an easy way to raise funds. The gift cards provide a 3 to 5% return on the value of the card to the church.


And, of course, we all get to sing every Sunday morning, even if we don't join a choir. I hope you catch a tune to whistle through the week!




Women's Devotional Bible -**New International Version**


Is this Your Idea of a Good Time. God? Discovering Yourself in Biblical Stories

ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Last year was a full year for the GCUC Christian Education group, and this year promises to be equally busy. To start the year, Kevin McComas led a study group that explored the origins of the Bible. The group examined such topics as whether the Canon of the Bible should be re-opened versus leaving it as it as - a completed work. Kevin has done some marvellous study on his own to prepare for this engaging study group. Thanks Kevin!

Looking ahead, our next study group is based on the DVD boxed set titled "Uppity Women of the Bible." The four-volume DVD-based series features Hebrew Bible Professor Dr. Lisa Wolfe. Combining careful scholarship with humour and fresh insights, Dr. Wolfe presents food for lively, thoughtful discussion of Ruth, Esther, Judith, The Song of Songs.

In the "Ruth Study," we will look at the vulnerability of widows, the difficult situation of foreigners in Biblical times, and themes of loyalty, bitterness, courage, poverty, and seduction. In Esther, a book in which God is never mentioned, we enter into an exotic and fanciful Persian kingdom complete with a dim-witted King, a defiant Queen, and a loyal uncle.

In the Apocryphal book of *Judith*, believed to be a parable, we look at the themes of piety, lust, and violence amid the backdrop of warfare and intrigue. The "*Song of Songs*" is an intricate and sometimes puzzling book. Who wrote it? What sort of people are the main characters? Is it historical or mythical? Who is the Powerful Woman in this poetic book?

Join us in Room "A" starting October 23rd, at 11:25 AM as we take a closer look at these powerful women of Old Testament times.

Looking even further ahead to the winter and spring, there will be two more studies. Our Lenten study is called "Victory and Peace or Justice and Peace." This DVD-based study featuring John Dominic Crossan explores the juxtaposition of Roman Imperial Theology and the Kingdom of God. It tackles many thought-

provoking questions. What is the Character of your God? What is the Content of your Faith? What is the Purpose of Your Prayer? What is the Function of Your Church?

Later in the spring, we hope to offer another short study group to finish off the year. At present, there are just too many topics from which to choose, but we'll settle on something in the New Year. Watch for announcements in the Sunday bulletin.

OUTREACH CORNER

I will say right up front that I am looking for help to shape the Outreach Program so if you don't think you would have the time, save yourself some time and stop reading now.

I am looking for two or three people to help me create an Outreach "portfolio" that answers our call as a congregation to connect us in service as a Christian community with our local and global communities.

Currently, the Outreach Program is made up of three ongoing programs:

- Peri Kerr and her team of 20 congregants and community volunteers donate their time to work at the Food Cupboard every six weeks.
- Kathryn Graham represents Glen Cairn United Church on the inter-church Refugee Sponsorship Committee that brings families to Canada and helps them settle in to our city. Our congregation commits funds on an annual basis to support this program.
- The Monthly Appeal program responds to ad hoc requests for goods and money that come from a local or global community outside the church. Each month, I select one request as the "monthly project," advertise it, and individuals in the congregation respond to the appeal as they are able.

There are other instances of outreach in the congregation, individually-sponsored events that raise funds for organizations in need. These events are not "under the Outreach umbrella," so, although I am aware of some projects, I cannot identify them all. In fact, we, as a congregation, really do not know the scope and extent of all our outreach efforts.

With that in mind, I am asking you to consider a few questions. Are you satisfied that we, as a congregation, are doing all we can to reach out to, connect with, and serve others both locally and globally? What else could we do? What talents and resources do we have as a Christian community that we could harness to make a tangible difference in the world? Are you willing to help in some way to make it happen?

Right now, I am a "committee of one." Council members have joked that my meetings must be short since no one disagrees with me. While that may be so, if Outreach continues to be a committee of one, the shape of Outreach would reflect my thoughts and ideas only and not the spirit and intention of the congregation of Glen Cairn United.

I believe that a truly strong, viable, sustainable Outreach Program reflects who we are as a congregation and the energy we are willing to put into making this world a better place. A sustainable Outreach Program evolves according to the needs of the time and the will of the congregation, not just one individual.

So, are <u>you</u> willing to help? Should we enhance the three programs we have? Should we add new

GLEN CAIRN UNITED IS NOW ON FACEBOOK!

Thanks to the foresight and initiative of long-time congregational member Dave Leclair, our church now has an attractive and informative Facebook page which all can easily access to learn of upcoming church and community events.

If you have already created your own Facebook account, you are in good company: close to one billion people worldwide (that's roughly one out of every 7 people on the planet!) use it to keep in touch with families and friends, and to learn about the community, association, and hobby groups to which they belong. Not bad for a service created by some Harvard University undergrads in February 2004, not quite eight years ago!

Not already enrolled?

For those who have heard of this rapidly-growing social media phenomenon, but know little about it, here is some information - and, we trust, reassurances - to help you decide whether you would like to become part of this world-wide communications phenomenon.

- First, the church's Facebook account will only be used to make you aware of upcoming church events and special occasions which, as an active member of our congregation, we are <u>sure</u> you would not want to miss!
- Second, this service will provide our Minister, Rev. Copeland, with a forum to share with you some of his thoughts relating to our faith and morals, and perhaps even news from Presbytery or the wider United Church of Canada after all, we are just one congregation among many across the country.

Third, this will provide a means for <u>you</u> to contribute your own thoughts and observations on church activities and policies, <u>and</u> to link to other members of our congregation whom you might like to know a bit better than just saying "Hi!" to on a Sunday morning.

To allay any concerns you might have about setting up your own Facebook account, and to learn how to do it properly once you've decided to take the plunge, Dave has kindly provided the following suggestions regarding privacy and security.

We encourage everyone to take advantage of this means to stay in touch, especially if you can't make it out to church every Sunday or attend every exciting church event in the months ahead.

Privacy and Security

The GCUC Facebook page has been created with all the available security features. As well, the Page Administrators will be notified immediately by E-mail when anyone makes a post on the page, so the use of the page can be properly monitored and filtered.

However, as it is a public page in order to provide access to both the congregation and the community at large, care should be taken to <u>not</u> include personal information in any of your posts (e.g.: telephone numbers, street addresses, E-mail addresses, *etc.*).

We also recommend that you activate <u>all</u> of the Facebook privacy features available on your own personal Facebook page to ensure that only your friends have access to your page. In that way, no one will be able to "click" on your name in any post you make and obtain unauthorized access to your page.

The tools are easy to use: just go to "Home-Privacy Settings" in the upper right corner of your page and make your selections. Consult the Facebook "Help Centre" for further information.

How to Make a Post on the Page

Posting a comment on the GCUC Facebook page is quite simple. Go to the "Post" box (containing the words "Write Something...") near the top of the page, type in your comment, and press the "Share" button. Your comment will appear beside your name at the top of the "wall," the portion of the page where all posts are listed. Both text and photos may be posted on the page. However, videos are prohibited as videos circulating around Facebook sometimes contain viruses.

Feel free to post comments about your own GCUC experiences, or on someone else's post, including "liking" their comment.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

Operation Christmas Child brings joy and hope to children in desperate situations around the world through gift-filled shoe

boxes and the message of God's unconditional love. It provides an opportunity for people of all ages to be involved in a simple, hands-on project of Samaritan's Purse that focuses on the true meaning of Christmas - Jesus Christ - God's greatest gift.

Operation Christmas Child was started in 1990 by Dave Cooke, a Welshman who felt moved to deliver gifts to Romanian orphans after seeing their living circumstances on television. In 1993, Operation Christmas Child grew and was adopted by Samaritan's Purse, a Christian organization run by Franklin Graham.

To date, Operation Christmas Child has collected and distributed over 86 million shoe box gifts worldwide. Each shoe box gift is filled with hygiene items, school supplies, toys, and candy, and is given to children regardless of gender, race, religion, or age. When culturally appropriate, copies of a book entitled *The Greatest Gift of All*, which has been translated into 130 different languages, are offered to children after the shoe box has already been distributed.

SUMMARY OF THE OCTOBER 2011 MEETING OF OTTAWA PRESBYTERY

Ottawa Presbytery met at Manotick United Church on Tuesday, October 11th. The congregation warmly greeted presbyters and hosted a tasty 100-Mile Dinner.

Chair Rev. Dianne Cardin called the meeting to order and Catherine McVie, Chair of Manotick United Church Council, extended words of welcome. The congregation's worship band and Rev. Elaine Beattie led the court in worship focusing on creation. Following the routine opening business motions, Rev. Brian Cornelius, Treasurer, led the court through a preliminary look at the 2010 Reviewed Financial Statements and the 2012 proposed budget and assessments. These financial considerations will be decided in November. The proposed budget is a deficit one which takes into account that the Presbytery holds about \$98,000

in retained earnings. The proposed assessments are based on a 2.75% increase.

There was a focus on Youth and Young Adult Ministry as the Presbytery covenanted with the Rev. Hilary Merritt as the YAYA Presbytery Minister, and some of those who attended *Rendez-Vous*, the national United Church gathering for youth and young adults held in Toronto in August, reported on their experience. Those who shared were enthusiastic about the impact of *Rendez-Vous* in conveying energy, creativity and hope about the place of youth and young adults in the church.

Kiersten Jensen, Resource Centre Coordinator reminded presbyters of the upcoming Resource Fair and Learning Event. The theme this year is art and spirituality. Rick Balson talked about the photography workshop he will lead and Isabel Bender gave some highlights of the quilting workshop.

Rev. Grant Dillenbeck, Chair of the Mission Strategy Working Group of Ottawa Presbytery, highlighted the work of the denomination on new strategies for ministry and mission through EDGE. Those interested in the program and resources being offered can visit http://blogs.united-church.ca/edge/. Rev. David Sherwin then told the court about his application to the New Ministries Formation Fund through the United Church of Canada. He is proposing an arts-based ministry which would link the creative arts with spirituality and faith. David indicated that his hope is that Ottawa Presbytery would be willing to consider whether his project might be a "presbytery-recognized ministry."

"C'est la Vie," an ongoing movement by the French Ministries Committee which helps to build an understanding and vocabulary about ministry in French, was presented by Nicole Beaudry and Angelika Piché. It was a reminder that while some church terms are easily transportable from one language to another, other terms need a greater awareness of the appropriate translation. The French Ministry Committee is also looking for congregations who would be interested in hosting "Chantons Noël," a service of carol and readings in French during the Advent season. Those interested should contact Nicole.

There was to have been a presentation by the Church in Society Committee on the United Church of Canada program "Covenanting for Life," however, due to overrun in agenda time, it was deferred to a future meeting. However, Chair of CIS Rev. Ellie Barrington gave a brief introduction to the focus of the program. "A Covenant for Life in Creation" is proposed for adoption at the next General Council in 2012. This process calls us to renew, affirm, and live out the United Church's historic commitment to making our faith manifest in the world. Questions from the floor noted that General Council is seeking a response by October 15th. A motion was then considered giving indication of support in principle by Ottawa Presbytery and was carried.

The meeting closed with a benediction by Rev. Elaine Beattie. The Presbytery will next meet November 8th at Stittsville United Church.
